Dennis Hizer

Last rites were conducted Tuesday at the Harrison funeral home in Kewanna for Dennis HIZER, 78, R.R. 2, Kewanna, who died Sunday at the home of a brother, Nelson, R.R. 2, Kewanna.

The Rev. Kenneth OVERMYER officiated at the funeral and burial was in the Grass Creek cemetery. Death came to Mr. Hizer after a long illness.

A retired farmer, he was born in Grass Creek on April 5, 1884, the son of Aaron and Caroline SOMMER HIZER. He was a member of the Grass Creek E.U.B. church.

Howard C. Hays

Howard C. HAYS, 54, 311 East 14th street, who was making a special trip to deliver a tank of bottle gas to a customer, was killed instantly at 9:02 p.m. Tuesday when his truck was hit by an Erie-Lackawanna railroad passenger train.

The accident occurred at the Pershing grade crossing in Rochester township, five miles west of the city.

An employee of the Thermo Gas company of Peru and its predecessor, the Indiana Bottle Gas company, for 18 years, Hays was on a special call when his 1962 Chevrolet pickup was smashed by eastbound train number two, which was traveling 75 miles an hour.

Sheriff Willard CLARK and State Trooper Larry WAGENKNECHT said the crossing was unobstructed and dry and that the truck left no skid marks.

Engineer George PONTIOUS, Huntington, said he saw the truck approaching the crossing and that he blew the train's whistle. Clark said the train hit the left side of the truck "dead center" and carried the vehicle 1.1 mile down the track and past the next crossing. Gilbert CRUMLEY, Huntington, was conductor of the train.

It took workers about an hour to get the truck off the front of the diesel locomotive and to extricate Hays from the truck. Dr. Howard C. ROWE, Fulton county coroner who pronounced Hays dead, said the man sustained a fractured skull and that his arms and legs were broken.

One of the nine tanks of bottle gas that were on the truck fell out of the vehicle and caught fire. Officers let the fire burn itself out and Rochester firemen stood by to prevent the blaze from spreading.

Clark said a woman witness told him she saw the crash. She said she did not see any brake lights on the truck come on before the accident. Assisting Clark, Wagenknecht and Dr. Rowe in the investigation was Lyman Baker, deputy coroner.

Ernest Nichols

Fulton county's second traffic fatality in less than two weeks came in below zero weather at 7:15 p.m. Saturday. Ernest NICHOLS, 56, R.R. 2, Rochester, was killed when his pickup truck was hit by an Erie-Lackawanna train at the Athens crossing.

The Henry township farmer was driving to his home north of Athens after feeding cattle at the other farm when the westbound string of eight deisel engines coupled together smashed the truck broadside. The truck was pushed 206 feet down the track and down an embankment on the south side of the track.

Dr. Howard ROWE, Fulton county coroner, said Nichols died instantly of multiple skull fractures.

Two and a half years ago, Ernest Nichols' brother, Max [NICHOLS], 61, also R.R. 2, Rochester, was injured fatally in a two-car crash four miles southeast of Rochester. The accident occurred on July 2, 1960.

State police and the sheriff's office investigated Saturday's crash. They said the Athens road was quite slippery at the crossing because of packed snow and that buildings obscure vision to the east for a north-bound driver approaching the crossing. Vision at the crossing itself is unobstructed, however.

The buildings also obscure vision from a westbound train of the south side of the crossing.

There are no flasher signals at the crossing, although there are warning signs.

A farmer and livestock dealer, Nichols had just driven away from a service station a block south of the crossing and was going to his home 2 1/2 miles north of Athens.

A witness, Michael D. HARROLD, Akron, was on the north side of the tracks. He said he could not determine if Nichols saw the train and skidded into its path or whether he was unaware of the train's approach.

The train was going about 55 miles an hour, according to Garth UNDERHILL, 45, the engineer. Fred BENNETT, 22, was the flagman. Both are from Huntington. The engines were being taken to Chicago to pick up trains.

The 1941 GMC pickup truck was nearly shorn in two and was pushed down an embankment and through a fence before landing in the yard of Mrs. J. W. KERN. Nichols' body was stretched cross the door of the truck.

The front diesel of the train sustained \$1,000 damage while the truck was listed a total loss at \$2,900 damage.

Ernest Nichols was born in Fulton county May 19, 1906 to William and Maude BARR NICHOLS. He had lived all his life in this county. He was married Jan. 14, 1929 in Detroit,

Mich., to Helen BRYANT. He was a member of the Akron Church of God.

State police stated that the Berkshire auto, going north, apparently started to pass another auto in the northbound lane and in doing so struck the Goldsmith car.

Goldsmith said he was enroute south at about 40-50 miles an hour when the car pulled out from the northbound lane and he could not avoid the head-on crash.

After impact, the Berkshire auto burst into flames from gasoline under the hood and then the two truck drivers came onto the scene.

Mrs. Berkshire was pronounced dead at the scene by the county coroner, Dr. Howard ROWE.

Berkshire and Goldsmith were rushed to Woodlawn hospital. Berkshire was admitted and Goldsmith was to be taken by ambulance to South Bend this afternoon. Extent of the two men's injuries was not immediately determined.

State police estimated damage at \$500 to the Dodge and \$900 to the Lark. The sheriff's office and city police all aided in the investigation.

He also had been one of the founders of the Rochester country club and captained its golf team for several years.

Born May 8, 1868, on a 400-acre farm south of Leiters Ford, Charles Cisco CAMPBELL was eldest of eight children of Christopher and Rebecca ZOOK CAMPBELL, pioneer settlers of Aubbeenaubbee township. He worked his way through both.

Fulton county's worst traffic crash in two years snuffed out three lives Thursday and sent the county's toll of highway victims soaring to a near-record-breaking nine with the year less than half over. The worst previous year for traveling on Fulton county roads was 1955 when 10 were killed.

Killed instantly at 4 p.m. Thursday when a motorcucle traveling at high speed went out of control and hit a utility pole a mile east of Rochester on the Old Fort Wayne road were:

John "Pat" BRUBAKER, 31, Mishawaka, a former resident and driver of the motorcycle, and his cousin, Gary ZIMMERMAN, 8, son of Mr. and Mrs. Forest ZIMMERMAN, LaPorte.

Injured fatally was Brubaker's daughter, Teresa [BRUBAKER], 15, who died at Woodlawn hospital two hours after the crash.

Police said that Brubaker was going west and was unable to negotiate a curve. The cycle went into a ditch on the south side of the road, traveled 50 feet, struck a fence and went along side the fence 62 feet before striking the pole head-on. The cycle struck the pole with such force that it broke it off at the ground.

Brubaker's body was thrown about 12 feet from the cycle and the girl was thrown 31 feet. The boy was found near the back wheel of the motorcyucle. All suffered skull fractures.

Robert EBER, R.R. 1, Rochester, told police that Brubaker had passed him shortly before the accident at a high rate of speed.

Damage was estimated at \$900 to the 1960 Harley Davidson motorcycle, owned by Robert GAMBLE, Rochester, Brubaker's father-in-law, whom the Zimmermans and Brubakers were visiting. A witness, Mrs. Sharon BOWERSOX, Leiters Ford, was stopped on the east side of the tracks. Mrs. Bowersox told police that she saw the Zellers' auto coming towards her and that the car started to skid when the driver apparently saw the train. The auto skidded 100 feet before impact.

Police believe that Zellers was temporarily blinded by the sun and was unable to see the flashers at the crossing. Police checked the flashers and they were in working order.

Vern J. McCain

It will be "two or three days" before the cause of death of a Fulton county mechanic, who was found dead in his garage in the southeast part of the county Tuesday, will be determined.

This was stated this morning by Dr. Clarence COBB, a pathologist at the Logansport state hospital who conducted a post-mortem examination of the body.

The mechanic, Vern J. McCAIN, 56, was found dead Tuesday at 2:05 p.m. in a garage at his home, R.R. 1, Macy, in the southeast corner of Fulton county. The body lay in a pool of blood, with a small wound in the back part of the right side of the head.

Meanwhile, an intense investigation is underway by state police and the sheriff's office, who cannot rule out the possibility of foul play until cause of the death is established.

Dr. Cobb's examination did disclose the man did not suffer a heart attack, nor was he shot. Police believed at first that a small hole in the man's head could have been caused by a bullet, but the autopsy ruled out this theory.

Dr. Cobb performed a full autopsy at Zimmerman Brothers funeral home. He said McCain suffered "a minor blow on the head, lay on the floor and died."

The blow knocked McCain unconscious, but did not cause death, Dr. Cobb stated. He said McCain could have died of exposure. He sent specimens of the body to the Medical Center for further tests.

The body was discovered by Howard SLIFER, Jr., McCain's employer, who operates a Ford Automobile agency at Twelve Mile. Slifer went to McCain's farm home because McCain had not reported for work Tuesday morning. Slifer said McCain was "very prompt and if he was going to be even 15 minutes late for work, he would always call."

Slifer said that when he got to the farm, he noticed the garage door open about a foot and that the lights were on. When he looked into the garage, he saw McCain's body on the floor between two cars, with his head under one car and his feet under the other.

County Coroner Dr. Howard ROWE said McCain had died late Monday night. The exposure theory of the cause of death was supported by the low temperatures of Monday night.

Sheriff Willard CLARK said it appeared McCain had been polishing one of the cars in the garage. A can of polish and some rags were on the rear deck of one of the autos. The top of one of the cars appeared to have been cleaned off or partially polished.

Clark also said that two dogs were guarding the body and that they had to be lured away before the body could be examined.

The sheriff said there was no evidence of looting in the house and that the television set still was operating. Over \$15 was found in McCain's clothes by police.

McCain's wife, Opal [McCAIN], told Detective Sergeant Rex DILLMAN of the Peru state police post that she hadn't been home since late Sunday night. She said she worked in Chicago but had gone to a doctor in Logansport Tuesday and was there when notified of the death of her husband.

Cause of death cannot be determined until Dr. Cobb completes his examinations of

specimens and examination of other specimens that were sent to the Indiana University Medical Center in Indianapolis are completed.

Dr. Cobb will give his findings to Coroner Howard ROWE, who will determine if death was accidental.

Investigating with Dillman, Clark and Drs. Cobb and Rowe are State Troopers James JOHNSON, Larry WAGENKNECHT and Don SMITH of Fulton county, Sgt. Ed LIKENS, state police district laboratory technician from Lafayette, and Deputy Coroner Lyman BAKER.

McCain moved to Fulton county eight months ago from Logansport, where he had lived for about a year. He had worked at Twelve Mile for eight months, also.

He was born on July 1, 1907 in Carroll county to Martin and Daisy Ann GORDON McCAIN.

Surviving are the wife; a daughter, Mrs. Eva Irene GALOB, Chicago; a granddaughter; two sisters, Mrs. Susie LEES and Mrs. Edna ARMSTRONG, Bunker Hill, and three half-brothers, Joseph McCAIN, Indianapolis, and James and Frank McCAIN, South Bend.
